Year 5 have had an exciting and creative term! After the success of the Aglica Trio Graphic Scores Project, sponsored by Mr Hugonin, Year 5 were very privileged to be invited to Mr Hugonin's studio. Once there, they were introduced to his art work and the complex processes that go into creating his intricate and very beautiful art work. Year 5 deepened their understanding of abstract and minimalist art and were able to gain an insight into the ideas behind his abstract pieces. They were able to interview him with their excellent questions about his work during a Q and A session, and they took part in two creative activity sessions. In one of these sessions they worked with artist Sarah Bray, Mr Hugonin's wife, on an abstract charcoal session in response to minimalist music. In the second session they worked with Alex, Mr Hugonin's studio assistant, creating their own James Hugonin masterpiece on a grid using his templates and a colour theme. It was a wonderful afternoon and very inspirational. Thanks to all the team at the studio for making us so welcome and to Year 5 for being so polite, so engaged and for their wonderful behaviour!



Year 5 Virtual Fieldtrip to the Arctic

Year 5 were lucky enough to attend a virtual field trip to the Arctic where they spent the day immersing themselves in an Arctic experience. There were over 270 children from KS2 classes all over the U.K in attendance on a zoom. Over the course of the day, we explored the following enquiry question together: 'What is so cool about the Arctic?'. Children were given the chance to explore the arctic using digital satellite technology and through fact sheets. Children were then given the chance to ask a real life Arctic Explorer questions over zoom before exploring Svlarbard's climate. It was truly an incredible experience. The whole experience was constantly linked back to Climate Change and children were repeatedly asked to consider the importance of Climate Change initiatives when thinking about the Arctic.



Y5 Dodgeball Tournament @ Berwick Leisure Centre

Throughout the year, Year 5 have been lucky enough to have Mr Marklew and the Sports Leaders working on building their Dodgeball Skills. This event was all about participation and ensuring that children who may not normally feel like 'athletes' had a chance to take part in a low stakes competition. Amazingly, our schools teams placed 1st, 2nd and 3rd vs other Berwick schools. Max said, 'I loved taking part and was very impressed by the other school's players.' Jessica said, 'I found the experience very inspirational and we gained so much from it.' Alnwick Castle Trip 22.05.2023

On the 22nd of May we went on a school trip to Alnwick Castle, and met our guides Matthew and Allan. We learnt about how it had never been taken by force, due to its many fortifications and how the Percy Family had been there for 700+ years.

During our tour we learnt about things such as the Barbican. This was an outer fortification and the way through was known as the killing zone. The army of Alnwick would pour boiling sand onto the Scottish which would burn through the skin, then poo and pee would be poured onto them which would cause infections. The Scots would try to run through but the men at the back would unknowingly push the men at the front into the dry moat where they would be trapped. Alnwick castle was never taken by an attacking army.

Then we built our own mini castle. Our budget was £20,000 that is around 14 million back in those times. We made a castle wall with 8 pieces and we had a clock tower. We also added cannons, two barbicans, a church, a stable and a wet moat.

Whilst we were at Alnwick Castle, Matthew and Alan took us for a tour around the castle walls, including the very interesting Barbican Gate House, which is like a more fortified gateway into the castle. Once you entered the first humongous door you met a long corridor called the killing zone, however you have to make your way through iron gates. Enemies would meet hot sand and the dry moat, if you fell into the dry moat you would hit the spikes and die. Also, we saw the gun terrace and the canons. This was originally built for the Lady to look out on the landscape which was specially designed by Capability Brown.

In the fortress workshop we had to work in little groups to create a castle. We needed walls, barbicans, horses, workmen plus more. You had to buy all of these we had a max of £20,000. We worked it out and we were in budget by £4,000 roughly.

Geography skills in the field. This data was then analysed in school and used to compare Wooler to Death Valley in North America. Newsflash, it's very different! Izzy said, 'I loved stopping and listening to the river and the sounds of the birds.'




Year 5 Rivers trip – Breamish Valley

In Geography this term we have been studying rivers. We have been looking at their features, how humans use them, the journey of a river and so much more. We were lucky enough to have education officers from the Northumberland National Park in school to give us an overview of rivers. During this time we were able to use a parachute to help show how a river erodes and shapes the land. To make this learning real, Y5 were able to visit the Breamish Valley at a section of the River Breamish and spent the day completing Geography fieldwork in the river.

Northumberland National Park led the session and as a class we recorded measurements of the rivers width, depth and speed. We were then able to create a cross section of a river when we returned to school (see picture!). Also, we went river dipping and were able to use classification keys to find out what we had caught.

After a busy morning, we spent the afternoon walking up to the top of Brough Law to get a stunning view back down the valley. We then completed a field sketch and labelled the key features of the river that we could see. Sam said, 'It was the best field trip of all times, I loved learning about the animals that inhabit the river.' Holly K said, 'I loved using the identification keys to work out what was lurking in the river.' 'On the top of Brough Law the view was breath-taking, I was beyond proud that we all made it to the top.' Holly R. Louis said, 'Even though it was rainy and windy, the view at the top was so worth it.'



- Buy uniform
- Get school shoes
- Check primary school jobs are up to date

Primary school jobs include:

- Diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis and polio (4 in 1 booster)
- Meadles, mumps and rubella (2nd dose of MMR)

If you are not sure if your child has had all their routine vaccinations, check their personal health record (Red Book) or contact the GP surgery. To get the best protection for your child, they need to have had two doses of MMR1 vaccine. For a checklist of the vaccines and the ages at which they should ideally be given visit:
