Dear Parents/Carers

Welcome to the start of the 2023-2024 academic year. It has been a busy few days welcoming all of the children into school and establishing our school routines again. I would like to take this opportunity to extend a warm welcome to all children and families starting with us this autumn across the Nursery, First School and Middle School. Parents and carers can expect the usual communications from teachers and form tutors at the start of term regarding children's learning and timetables/kit days for this term. We also have a couple of staffing changes this year with Miss Malthouse teaching in Year 1 while Mrs Moscrop is on maternity leave and we welcome Mr Newton who is teaching in Year 2 following Mr Tait's departure in July. I am picking up SENDCo duties while Mrs Moscrop is away.

We are keeping sensible arrangements in place around hygiene here in school but the vast majority of our COVID measures have now been stepped down (but remain ready to reinstate if necessary). Our final step down is a welcome return to 'family' seating arrangements in the lunch hall. This means no more strict rows and year group separation with WFS children seated in groups of mixed year groups with Year 4 table leaders and GMS children being able to make their own seating choices. This worked brilliantly, and felt great this week but we will continue to monitor this over the coming weeks and months. We have been told to expect further bouts of respiratory illness over the winter and the most important action for all parents and carers is to be vigilant for any illness and act appropriately. We expect to have the annual winter colds and flu along with the common childhood illnesses to manage but COVID has not gone away and we all must remain vigilant to protect ourselves, families and work colleagues and to keep our schools open and operating well.

COVID - Four key control measures:

- **Hygiene** (Handwashing/sanitising cleaning respiratory hygiene PPE)
- **Ventilation** (*Natural ventilation windows/doors open management of temperature and energy use will be a challenge*)
- Vaccination (Take up vaccination offers as they arise this autumn)
- Follow Public Health advice

+ Planning for an outbreak in school

Attendance

School attendance continues to be a focus area for schools across the country post-pandemic. This is the case for our schools here in Wooler as well. We had an up-and-down year with attendance last year with some periods where pupil attendance was back to pre-pandemic levels (over 96%) and others where we fell short of that level. Over all our attendance figures for the 2022-2023 academic year were around 93%...this year we aim to do better! The government has identified this as a national priority and have published documentation for schools and parents/carers. This is called 'Working together to improve school attendance'. The updated Keeping Children Safe In Education legislation also makes much greater emphasis on the important of maintain good levels of school attendance. The message is clear – attendance needs to improve and we all need to work together to achieve that for our children. If you child's attendance was low last year you can expect some contact from us here at school to improve that this year.

Food in school

This is an important one as we have two children here in school with serious nut allergies. We can not have any peanuts in school at all. This includes peanut derived products - the children have been great this week as we have discussed this and they have been checking items in their lunch boxed and morning snacks with me and my colleagues. All staff have been trained to respond to a severe allergic reaction/anaphylactic shock and we now have several auto-injector pens in school that we can use in an emergency with any child if directed to do so from health colleagues on a 999 call. Hopefully this will not be needed!

The message is a simple one – no peanuts in school and products with nuts in are to be avoided. Thank you in advance for your help and understanding with this serious issue.

Wooler & Glendale specific routines and procedures

Wooler First School:

- Wooler First School starts at 9.00am each day the site will be open for children to start arriving from 8.45am children will not be allowed onto the school site before this time. Children will head straight into school via their classroom doors where they are greeted by their teachers. This worked well last year and created a calm and purposeful start to the day. All children are to be in their classrooms ready for morning registration by 9.00am each morning so getting here on site for just before 8:55am is ideal. I will continue to undertake morning duty welcoming children to school each day and supporting our younger children from school transport.
- Wooler First School finishes between 3.15pm and 3.25pm each day children will exit from school by their classroom exits and staff will identify parents and carers for safe handover at home time. Children on school transport will remain with their teachers and engage in 1:1 and small group activities before being guided to their transport by duty staff at 3.30pm ready to be joined by the older pupils from Glendale.

Oak Class will finish at 3.15pm - Cherry & Cedar Classes at 3.20pm - Willow & Maple Classes at 3.25pm

Little Acorns Nursery will be following the same daily operation procedures as outlined for Wooler First School
above. We will be maintaining the arrangements for drop-off and collection that are currently in place to
minimise congestion at these times. Parents will not be allowed into the nursery and will continue to drop-off
and collect children from the designated point next to the entrance ramp for the swimming pool. Session times
will be confirmed as normal directly from Gillian in the nursery.

Classes for September with teacher contacts:

Oak Class – Miss Symons (3.15pm finish) Cedar Class – Mr Newton (3.20pm finish) Maple Class – Mrs Alexander (3.25pm finish) Cherry Class – Miss Malthouse (3.20pm finish) Willow Class – Miss Matthews (3.25pm finish)

Glendale Middle School:

- Glendale Middle School starts at 8.55am each day and all children will again congregate on the rear yard before school. The site will be open for children to start arriving from 8.45am children will not be allowed onto the school site before this time. Children will assemble at their designated points before heading into school for morning registration in their form groups. All children are to be on the rear yard by 8.55am each morning so getting here on site for 8:50am is ideal.
- Glendale Middle School finishes at **3.35pm** each day for all pupils children will exit from school onto the rear yard and make their way out of school by the pedestrian access point or head to their school transport assembly point outside the hall. Duty staff will check bus and taxi lists and guide children to their transport providers.

Form tutors for September:

These systems worked very well this week and all of the children now know exactly where they need to be as they arrive at school and as they depart at the end of the day. If you have any question regarding your child here at school the teachers and form tutors noted above should be your fist port of call.

Routines and procedures across both of our schools:

- Parental vehicles will not be permitted to come into the school car park to drop off or collect children. Use of
 the school car park is permitted for parents and carers dropping off children at 8am to our before-school club
 and again in the evenings when collecting children from after-school club. Parents and carers undertaking
 Nursery drop-off & collection within the school day are also permitted to use the front car park. Children and
 parents are expected to walk or cycle to school where possible. If cars must be used parents must park well
 away from the school and walk in. All parents are expected to be sensible in where they park showing respect
 for our neighbours. It would be ideal if families could agree where older children will be met outside of school at
 home time for example in the car park next to the bowling club or the car park by the garden centre. Older
 children also need to be reminded that if they are not met as expected away from school at home time they
 must come back into school so that we can keep them safe until parents/carers arrive to collect them. These
 rules make it much safer for everyone arriving and departing from our schools your support is appreciated.
- All children must wash their hands before leaving home to come to school each morning. Enhanced personal hygiene routines will continue for all children with effective hand washing, use of sanitiser and good respiratory hygiene expected at all times.
- Children should wear their school uniform. The children have all presented for school looking very smart this week and staff have given a few gentle reminders regarding piercings etc. If you have allowed your child to have any piercings at the start of the summer holiday they are to be taken out for school. Any hair colouring must be of natural colour (no pink/blue etc. and no shapes or extreme cuts). Children should not wear any jewellery to school other than a wrist watch.
- Children must not bring toys from home. At Wooler First School water bottles will be kept in school and washed daily. At Glendale Middle children will continue to be expected to take responsibility for their water bottles bringing them into school and taking them home again each day. Clear bottles are needed here in school. Water will be available to children throughout the day.
- Children are expected to be in school every day but children who are ill must not attend school. All absences must be reported to school via telephone before 8.45am each day.

School Transport – the County Council transport providers are up and running and we have confirmed our start of term bus lists with them. I meet children arriving on school transport each morning and duty staff ensure that they are safely on the correct transport home again in the afternoon. Face coverings are not required on school transport this term for pupils. Any changes to normal transport arrangements must be communicated clearly to the ladies in the school office – thank you.

We have individual school photographs here in school on Monday 25th September and the immunisation team will be in school for annual flu vaccinations for all pupils on Tuesday 26th September. We also have a residential visit for our new Year 5s at Ford Castle just before the half term break. Our first significant school events will be our Harvest Festivals – further information on these to follow and we look forward so seeing lots of parents and carers here in school sharing in our celebrations. We are all looking forward to a full and successful year ahead across our schools and clarity regarding the decision to change the organisation of our schools and the wider Berwick Partnership of schools by the County Council from the start of the 2025-2026 academic year.

On the back of this letter is a reminder of the safeguarding leads across our schools and I will be following this communication with further safeguarding information as we move into the start of the academic year. Accompanying this letter is also information about Operation Encompass and how it operates here in our schools. My final note on this welcome letter is to remind everyone that we are also planning to have another work day to clear more of our Forest School later this term. The volunteers from the local log bank will be in and extra hands would be most welcome for a couple of hours - I will put out a paper note soon requesting help.
